2.	<p>Card game: Crazy Eights</p> <p>Each player is dealt seven cards.</p> <p>The remaining cards are placed face down in the centre of the table, forming a draw pile.</p> <p>The top card of the draw pile is turned face up to start the discard pile next to it.</p> <p>First player adds to the discard pile by playing one card that matches the top card on the discard pile either by suit or by rank (i.e. 6, jack, ace, etc.).</p> <p>A player who cannot match the top card on the discard pile by suit or rank</p>



My Read at Home 3

CARS

The first 'car' was made by a Frenchman called Nicolas Cugnot in 1769. This 'car' ran on steam. It was used by the French army to pull heavy cannons!

In the olden days, cars were not allowed to be driven faster than a person walking. A man carrying a red flag had to walk in front of the car to warn people that it was coming. These cars were called *horseless carriages*.



In 1886, two German engineers named Karl Benz and Gottlieb Daimler invented cars with engines. These cars ran quite like the cars we have nowadays.

In 1903, Henry Ford set up the Ford Motor Company in America. In 1908, the Ford Motor Company made a car called the Ford Model T. The company made millions of these cheaper cars. People could now afford to buy them. These cars were very popular all over the world.

In the early days, only very rich people had cars. Nowadays, many people have cars. Cars are getting better all of the time. They are safer and cleaner than they used to be. This is better for our world. I wonder what sort of car you will be driving when you grow up. ■





WARNING - TURN BACK!

Below are the answers to this week's maths puzzle and riddles written upside down. If you haven't tried them yet go back, have a go, and check back later to see if you were right!

Riddle 1: Andrew (and drew) Riddle 2: None as it was Noah not Moses on the ark! Maths Puzzle 1: $6 - 4 + 1 = 3$ or $8 - 4 - 1 = 3$



The answer is 1. The number of joints is the key (see circled). It decreases from 6,5,4, 3, 2 and finally just 1 joining!
