Topic: Weight

In 3rd class, we measure weight in kilograms (kg) and grammes (g). We should make ourselves familiar with what 1kg (1000g) feels like in our hands. Many items around the home will weigh 1kg. We often buy items such as sugar, rice or frozen chips in 1kg packs. When items weigh less than 1kg, they are measured in grammes. We should know the following:

$\frac{1}{4}$ kg	= .25kg	= 250g
$\frac{1}{2}$ kg	= .5kg	= 500g
$\frac{3}{4}$ kg	= .75kg	= 750g
1kg	= 1000g	



Task

1: Can you find some items around the house that weigh the above weights?

2: We ask you to take some items in your home that can be easily weighed on your kitchen scales and do some weighing. Before you place items on the scales, do some estimating :

Is the item greater (>) than 1kg, about 1kg or (<) 1kg?

Then check the actual weight.

Tip:

Have a look at the template at the bottom of the pack to help you ↓ .

Draw out a table similar to it in your copy to help keep track of your estimations and weights.

If you don't have a scales at home, have a look around the house to find items that weigh approx

$\frac{1}{2}$ kg (500g)


$\frac{3}{4}$ kg (750g)







Offline Activities -

Defend The Castle

How to set up:

- ✓ Play in teams (1 v 1 or 2 v 2 etc).
- ✓ Give half of the items to each team and ask them to build a 'Castle' by stacking them as they wish.



Equipment:

- ✓ Non-breakable items: plastic cups, shoes, pillows, etc
- ✓ Soft balls (or use rolled up socks)

How to Play:

- ✓ Each team must stay on their side of the playing area.
- ✓ When the game starts players must attempt to roll/throw/kick the soft balls (or sock balls) to knock down their opponents Castle.
- ✓ Play the game for 3-5 minutes, then allow teams to rebuild their Castle.

How to score:

- ✓ At the end of each game, the team whose castle is the most intact wins a point.
- ✓ After several rounds, the team with the most points wins the game.

PE PLANNING

Balancing Act

How to Play:

Playing in pairs:

- ✓ One player stands with their arms outstretched.
- ✓ The other player has 1 minute to safely balance as many items on the first player as possible.
- ✓ When the time is up, count how many items are balanced and then swap over. Who can balance the most items on their partner?
- ✓ To progress – difficult items can be worth more points.

Playing in teams (e.g. 2v2):

- ✓ One person from each team stands with their arms outstretched.
- ✓ The other players race to safely balance as many items as possible on their teammate.
- ✓ The team with the most items balanced, wins a point for the round.
- ✓ Play 3-5 rounds to see who can win the most points.



Equipment:

- ✓ Socks, tea-towels, books, coat-hangers, toys, etc.

How to score:

- ✓ Award 1 point for each item balanced successfully. Or 1 point for easy items and 2 points for difficult items.
- ✓ The player with the most points wins.
- ✓ If an item falls off, it must not be counted.

Topic of the Week - County Tipperary

This week we are continuing with our study of Co Tipperary. We will look at the physical geography of the county. In particular, we will identify the main mountains/mountain ranges as well as the county's main river - The River Suir.

Hopefully you made an attempt at drawing your own Tipperary map last week or maybe you used the blank template provided in last week's work-package.

This week, once you have studied the maps (later in this document) and watched the short video (see link across in the next column [□□□□](#)) you should be able to fill in these mountains on your map and perhaps use a blue pencil to draw in the journey of the River Suir.

Ideally, you could indicate the mountain ranges by drawing some brown or orange triangles like these on your map: ▲ ▲ ▲ and labelling them correctly.





My Read at Home 2



Rock that is deep under the ground is very hot. Some rock gets so hot it melts. Sometimes, this melted rock comes up through the ground. When the rock pours out of the ground, it forms a volcano. The melted rock flows down the sides of the volcano. This melted rock is called **lava**. There can be **hot ash** too.

There are lots of volcanoes all over the world. A volcano has a **crater** (big hole) in its top.

Some volcanoes have smoke coming out of the craters. Others have some ash and lava coming out, too. Some of them are very quiet. There are no volcanoes today in Ireland. But there used to be... long ago! ■

My Read at Home 3

Blue Planet


Earth is called the Blue Planet because about two-thirds of its surface is covered by water. Most of this is salt water. The water around the shores of Ireland is about 100–150 metres deep. However, it gets much deeper as you move out into the Atlantic Ocean. The bottom of the Atlantic Ocean is about four kilometres below the surface. This is too deep for sunlight to reach. Many strange sea creatures live there. The deepest water in the world is a massive 11 kilometres below the surface. It is so deep that nobody has ever gone to the bottom, not even in a submarine.

Many of the world's animals and plants live in the seas and oceans. Some are so tiny you would need a microscope to see them. They are called **plankton**. There are many more kinds of fish than there are birds or land mammals. The seas and oceans are home to more than just fish. Seals, whales and dolphins are all mammals that live in these waters. Many new kinds of sea animals are discovered every year. Many more are still to be found. Amazingly, we know more about outer space than we do about the seas and oceans of our own planet.




